What Does GPSC Do?

- › **Drive Action**—Help cities plan and deliver projects that reduce emissions, enhance resilience, and create new economic opportunities.
- › **Provide Knowledge and Tools**—Translate global expertise into diagnostics, toolkits, and reports that cities can apply to drive sustainability and job creation.
- › **Connect Cities and Partners**—Through forums, academies, and peer learning, help cities to share experiences, scale impact, and embed sustainability into their development.
- › **Mobilize Finance**—Build pipelines for urban climate and biodiversity funding, mobilizes investments in resilient, low-carbon solutions, and links cities to private sector and multilateral development bank financing.

Our Approach

The GPSC focuses on three interconnected themes: nature-positive and climate-resilient urban development, decarbonization of built environments, and the circular economy. Additional priorities include land use planning and urban strategy, inclusivity and gender equity, and engaging the private sector in sustainable urban financing.
